Colonial Secretary's correspondence

24 October 1837 (CSIL 37/10525 in 4/2361.3, reel 2206). Henry Hunt (Planter 1832), assigned servant of WH Clarke Esq of Pembrook (Upper Hunter) committed by magistrate 12 May 1837 for sheep stealing.

3 November 1837 (CSLS 4/3900 p262, reel 1064). Edward Hunt, Planter, life mitigated to 7 years, embarked on board Brig Gov. Phillip for Norfolk Island.

7 *December 1837* (CSLS 4/3684 p284, reel 1050). From Col Sec to the Commissioner of Assignment requesting a prisoner be assigned to Captain WH Clarke of Hunters River to replace Henry Hunt (Planter) who had been convicted of felony.

24 August 1843 (CSIL Norfolk Island 1843, 43/6612 in 4/2621.1, reel 767). Norfolk Island, recommended remission of sentence for good conduct, Henry Hunt (Planter 1832), colonial

conviction 11 September 1837, life to 7 years, served 6 years by September (1843). Remission approved by Gov George Gipps.

29 September 1843 (CSLS 4/3691 p147, reel 1053). Residue of Colonial Sentence remitted, Henry Hunt, from 1st December 1843.

6 January 1835 (SR, Merton Bench 1834-36, 4/5600 [reel 670]). Edward Hunt, Planter, 1832, 7 years, and Frances Cochrane, Parmelia, 1834, 7 years, assigned to Capt Clark, for desertion, deserted on 20th December last, captured by Thomas Bell on Liverpool Plains, guilty, 50 lashes each.

18 February 1835 (NSW GG 18 February 1835 p101). Hunt Edward, Planter, 23, London, butcher-boy, absconded from Capt. Clarke since 2nd February.

24 February 1835 (SR, Merton Bench 1834-36, 4/5600 [reel 670]). Edward Hunt, Planter, 1832, 7 years, and Frances Cochrane, Parmelia, 1834, 7 years, assigned to Capt Clark, for desertion, handed over from a constable at Patricks Plains, guilty, 12 months to an Iron Gang [note: and evidently then returned to their master].

17 September 1837. (SR, Sydney Gaol Entrance Book 1837- 1838, 4/6437 [reel 853]). Admitted (#1366) from Maitland Quarter Sessions for transportation, PS life. Transferred to HM Hulk 18 September 1837.

September 1837 (SR. Phoenix Hulk Entrance Book 1837, 4/6445, reel 820). Edward HUNT (Planter, 1832). Colonial Sentence at Maitland Quarter Sessions 12 September 1837, Life PS for sheep stealing.

21 October 1837. (SR, Sydney Gaol Entrance Book 1837- 1838, 4/6437 [reel 853]). Admitted (#1566) from HM Hulk for transportation PS life. Transferred to N Island per G Philip 4 November 1837.
